What is a sentence?

- A sentence is a group of words expressing a complete thought.
- It contains a subject, a verb, and a complete thought.

Somebody or Something Does or Is Something

A. Harry stole the cheese.

s ta art do Harry stole the cheese.

Harry	stole the cheese.
(Harry	did something.)

B. The dog was so hungry that he ate my shoe.

ART S IL ADV PA SC PN TA ADJ DO

The dog was so hungry that he ate my shoe.

The dog	was so hungry that he ate my shoes.
(The dog	was something: very hungry.)

C. Somebody broke the window.

S TA ART DO

Somebody broke the window.

Somebody	broke the window.
(We	want to know who did the action.)

D. Norman did it.

S TA DO

Norman did it.

(Now we know.)

Norman did it.

Why study how sentences are constructed?

- Power continues to be, generally, in the hands of the educated. Writing well gives you an edge in our extremely competitive professional world.
- Difficult writing cannot be demonstrated or even comprehended if students don't understand the basics.

Why study how sentences are constructed?

- In order for a student to understand the meaning of a word, let alone the meaning of an entire sentence, two things must happen:
 - the reader's internal representation of the word must be sufficiently complete and well-articulated to allow the intended meaning to be known
 - the reader must understand the context well enough to mentally select the intended meaning from the real of the word's possible meaning.

What is diagramming?

- Diagramming is a form of sentence analysis which requires one to take the sentence apart and show the relationship of EACH WORD to the rest of the sentence.
- A sentence diagram is like a puzzle which is not solved until all the parts are in the right place, and non are left over.

What is diagramming?

 Diagramming is a kind of dissection; as each part is taken out, it is identified and its relationship to the rest of the whole is revealed.
